Another year in transition continues as we say good-bye to Pat Hunter Gardiner, Interim Director of Religious Exploration and Douglas Barley, Choir Director.

Pat arrived ten months ago to help lead the Religious Exploration program during a year of intentional transition. Her work as an interim this year included keeping good boundaries around her time, helping the community grieve the loss of a beloved DRE and creating space for an new full-time director to take up the mantel. Not an easy task. We are grateful for Pat's grace in this unconventional work and her constant calm presence in the lives of our children and their families.

Doug's work in some ways was not so dissimilar to Pat's. He stepped in as a volunteer to take up the mantel of directing the choir during a period of conflict and confusion, heartache and reflection. He arrived with many musical talents and a breadth of knowledge to guide his work as his vision of music in the context of a worship service found both roots and wings. What is most extraordinary was the wisdom and agility that emerged as he helped a choir and community heal. I witnessed on more than one occasion the respect he earned from the choir members as he offered them space necessary to transition into a new vision of collaborative contemporary worship. Doug's healing ministry has been as vital to this congregation as his choir ministry (some may say more so). May we be forever grateful.

Over the past three years providing supervision and leadership to a professional staff team at UUCC has been primary in my work week. Together this team of five - Minister, DRE, Office Administrator, Choir Director, Small Group Ministry Coordinator - has stepped up to the plate time and time again to become stronger together and clearer in their ministries and roles in the community. Guided by a team covenant we have strove to build a healthy and cohesive team. Behind the scenes you will find staff are engage in monthly staff meetings, engaged in their professional organizations and building peer relations in the wider Unitarian Universalist community.

Next year our transitions will continue as we welcome in a full-time DRE and a new Choir Director. This vision of professional collaborative program and administrative staff will continue to grow as we continue to strive toward building and nurturing models of leadership rooted in healthy congregational systems and structures.

As you engage with staff this month, I invite you to share with them words of appreciation. Let them know you notice their commitment to this thriving and dynamic congregation.

Annual Meeting ~ Sunday, June 3rd ~ 10:00 am

All members are invited to the UCC Annual Meeting, for the third consecutive year incorporated into our Sunday worship on June 3 at 10 a.m.

Among the business to be discussed:

- Annual budget for 2012-13
- Naming of the UCC buildings
- Recommendations for Bylaw changes
- Reports of the Minister and Staff
- Report of the Leadership Development (Nominating) Committee

At least 30% of our 207 members must be present and voting to establish a quorum, so please join us.

Chalice Lighter Grant ~ To support the hiring of a full-time director and expanding our Religious Exploration program, UCC applied for and was awarded a \$5,000 Chalice Lighter Grant from the UUA's Northern New England District.

In a letter announcing the award, Board Chair Nancy Chad-dock said, "Increasing the hours for your religious exploration director position is an important step in the growth of your congregation. And it appears this growth is well underway with, for example, your recent increase in the number of young, single adults attending services and becoming members."

The UCC grant was the third and final award for the 2011-12 year. Another grant was provided to the Brunswick UU congregation, which is building a new church after a devastating fire destroyed the old one.

UCC members are invited to become Chalice Lighters themselves. Three times a year, members from throughout the NNED are asked to contribute at least \$15 for congregational needs in Maine, New Hampshire, and Vermont.

Display Case ...

The display for **May 27-June 17** will be on the historic figures from our Universalist and Unitarian History in Augusta. There were historically two churches of Unitarian and Universalist heritage in Augusta until consolidation into UU Community Church in 1992.

Rev. William Drew, Universalist (1708-1879)

- ◆ Minister, started the Universalist Church and was its minister 1835-1848.
- ◆ Active in early Universalism in Maine, including wide range of Universalist writings and edited periodicals.
- ◆ Active in promoting Maine life and agriculture.
- ◆ Active in Augusta, including public health concerns. Born in Hallowell.

Rev. Sylvester Judd, Unitarian (1813-1852)

- ◆ Minister, Unitarian Church 1840-1852.
- ◆ Graduated from Harvard and was connected with Unitarian leadership. Social activist
- ◆ Writer, including novel *Margaret*, and others describing New England life. Had local political connections.

Committee News ~ From Sept.- May our church **helps** serve a free meal at St. Mark's on the **1st Saturday** of each month. Our senior youth and the Peace Jam group have been there volunteering as well as baking desserts all year for that meal. Thank you to you all, you make a real difference.

Summer of 2012 ~ this will be the 3rd summer that we have led meals!! In the summer time our church **leads** the free community suppers which are held on the **3rd Saturday** of June, July and August at St. Mark's church. Their church is a-stones-throw away from ours on Summer St.. We do the planning, set-up, cooking ,serving and the clean-up.

We are lucky to have St. Mark's perennial volunteers to help us out as well. Six Augusta churches including ours, serve meals each month to those who are hungry, lonely , volunteers...In the summer one of those churches, which usually serves the 3rd Sat. meal, takes a break from serving -so St. Mark volunteered to cover it, but they were then serving 2 meals a month -so our church offered to lighten their load. Any where from 90-180 meals are often served, including take-home meals

Would you consider being a host family for a foreign exchange student? Having an AFS student in the family means a connection to the greater world. It also means a lot of fun experiences – real Thai food cooked in your own kitchen, laughing over language mistakes, help with Spanish or French homework, the excitement of exploring the same sights, but seeing them through new eyes. It is an amazing process.

Your new family member could be from Germany, Portugal, Chile, Turkey, Austria, Italy, Hong Kong, or perhaps Brazil, Sweden, or Ghana. AFS-USA exchanges with over 40 countries. You would be expected to provide a comfortable, caring home and food for a 15 to 18 year old who dares to live in a new country for 5 or 10 months.

The process starts right now and includes an application, an interview and help in selecting a student that will match your family. Most placements will be made before the end of June. AFS volunteers continue to provide support during the year.

Family Meditation:

For those who assume "my kids can't attend Family Meditation because they won't sit still and quiet for 45 minutes", here's some information. Our first Monday Family Meditation is usually adjusted to the age and abilities of those who attend. Sometimes we float around the sanctuary like a snowflake, sometimes we sing, sometimes we share a bit of fruit and savor it. We often read a book together. We talk. We share different mindfulness practices. If you think you might like to see what this is like, feel free to give a call (685-9270) or just show up. We have free child care after Family Meditation for parents who may be interested in exploring our adult meditation group.

Practice thoughts:

A sangha practice you might enjoy is "Yes! Thanks!" When we walk, sometimes we practice saying a silent "Yes!" as we breathe in and "Thanks!" as we breathe out. Every time our eyes connect with someone or something, this practice offers an opportunity to see things a little differently. As an example, the first time I tried this, we were doing a walking meditation in our sanctuary. At one point my eyes wandered out the window and I saw the electric lines. Electric lines are not something that generally enters my consciousness, except when they are in the way of something that I want to see – say, if I'm taking a photograph. However, this time practicing, "Yes! Thanks!" I thought of the fact that the lines make it possible for us to have electric lights and a sound system in our church. I now see electric lines differently than I used to. We can also look at someone or something that generally raises unhappy feelings in us. Saying, "Yes! Thanks!" can possibly open a door to seeing the barrier/unpleasant sight in a different way. Try it and see what happens for you. We only use practices that are helpful in our day-to-day lives.

A new way to look at our wild untamable brains:

Crazy Dog

I never met the Buddhist teacher who said, "Your thoughts are like Little Bo Peep's sheep;
Leave them alone and they'll come home wagging their tails behind them."
Perhaps it's because I've never met a shepherdess that I don't picture it quite like this.
For me, my mind is one of those over-exuberant fetching dogs:
a Golden Retriever, Irish Setter, or maybe an obsessive compulsive Jack Russell Terrier.
My dog goes out foraging and runs back to me, dropping its prize at my feet,
usually a dead squirrel or a half decomposed rabbit carcass.
He is utterly delighted with his gift.
He smiles and wags his whole hindquarters looking for my approval.
"Yuck, I don't want that."
Gingerly, trying not to look, I fling his treasure back into the woods.
He springs after it, so happy that I'm playing.
He trained me well.
In no time he bounds back with his prize.
He pants and his eyes dart back to the wood. Come on, throw it again.
Then I recall the only thing that can stop one of these retrieving machines.
I stop.
"Hey you." I whisper so he comes close. "Hey my crazy dog.
Thank you for working so hard. I know you're trying to take care of me."
I see the restlessness leave his eyes. He quiets and lays his muzzle in my lap.
I pet his head.
"Just rest. I'll take care of you." I say
And his eyes close.
