

The Rev. Douglas Wilson was born in Vancouver, grew up in Santa Barbara, and fell in love with the music of the Beatles and Bob Dylan in the mid-sixties. He graduated from UCSB in religion and philosophy and from Starr King School for the Ministry. In 1971 he was ordained in Brooklyn in 1971. After hiking the Appalachian Trail in 1973, he moved to UU Rowe Camp, which was founded in 1924. Doug founded UU Rowe Conference Center in 1974 and co-directed it, mostly with his wife Prue Berry, for 39 years. Since then, he's mostly been doing whatever he wants to do.

Doug is a writer, political activist, amateur comedian, wise guy, collage artist, and non-profit entrepreneur, his favorite oxymoron. In divinity school he heard ministers who haven't been to a church before try to say every-
thing they know, but hopefully he's outgrown this prophecy, so he'll only tell us <i>some</i> of what he knows.

Announcement: WORK CREW AUCTION FUNDRAISER!

The ever-popular UUCC Work Crews are up for auction again! This year, we will resume online bidding via email bids sent to Catherine Palmer (email: palmercatherinemaine@gmail.com). We have four one-half day work crews (this includes a group of 4-5 volunteers who can finish your indoor/outdoor chores (from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30, but workers will need snacks provided!). Bidding for the half-day work crews starts at \$400 charitable dollars. Organizers for the half-day work crews include Michaela Loisel, Denis Thoet, Karen Foust and Marilyn Dunn.

We also have one full-day work crew (this includes a group of 8-10 volunteers who work from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., but workers will need lunch provided). For the full-day crew, bidding will start at \$700 charitable dollars. Catherine and Becky will assemble the all-day work crew. All you do is make a list of what has to be done at your property.

Here's how bidding works. Beginning at noon on Monday, April 10, you may submit an email bid for one or more work crews. You can choose any summer day that works for the crew manager. If you are outbid, Catherine will let you know what the amount of the highest bid. PLEASE MARK YOUR EMAIL SUBJECT: "Half Day" or "Full Day" UU Work crew. Please give the crew managers an idea of what type of jobs are on your list, and what tools or supplies are required.

Bidding will end at 5 p.m on Friday, April 14. If there is a final bid within the last three minutes of the end of bidding, the bidding will be EXTENDED another three minutes until no one has entered a higher bid for a full three minutes (no one can win a work crew by waiting until just before the five o'clock close on April 14). You will be notified of the highest bid by email. Terry Cairn will serve as auctioneer for the final "live bidding" on Sunday, April 16, right after church service. All work crew winners must send full payment to UUCC in advance of their scheduled work crew day.



MUUSAN Updates

MUUSAN News: The Legislature is now holding Committee Hearings on the bills introduced this session. Here is just one example that many of us will want to pay attention to:

MUUSAN opposes LD 1038 which would re-instate plurality voting and abolish all ranked-choice voting laws in Maine. If enacted, this bill could return us to the days when legislators were elected by a minority of the voters. Support for this bill was surprisingly strong at the Committee on Veterans and Legal Affairs hearing, so MUUSAN urges people to ask their representatives to oppose this bill when it comes to the floor. In lieu of my own thoughts about our Congregation's interest in what more we might do to make our UU voices heard and impactful, attached to this E-blast is a letter submitted yesterday to the Joint Select Committee on Housing by Jane Makela (MUUSAN Steering Committee member) in support of this legislation:

LD 2 An Act to Address Maine's Housing Crisis

This bill establishes the Housing First Program within the Department of Health and Human Services to facilitate the delivery of stabilization and support services to residents of properties established or developed to provide permanent housing to persons who have been chronically homeless and to fund technical assistance, administered by the Maine State Housing Authority, for the development of housing consistent with the program. The program is funded from the real estate transfer tax by depositing half of the funds that would otherwise be deposited into the General Fund into the Housing First Fund created by the bill.

Observations from Afar - Don Naber

I am proud to be a member of UUCC. My feelings have been strengthened with the Saturday breakfast program and especially so when the church was kept open during last Saturday's storm for those who needed shelter from the weather. Since it began in February, people have come forward with food, with funds and with labor to make it successful. Efforts like this spark interest and participation in a church and meet a local community need. A little personal history seems in order.

There is a well-funded and effective homeless shelter in Waterville. It began humbly as an effort by the Waterville UU church to provide overnight accommodation in a local motel to the unhoused. After a short time part of a rental property was secured for lodging and an evening meal was provided for guests. Police from Augusta, Belfast and Pittsfield would occasionally drop off those needing care. As outside groups participated in staffing, including Colby College and other churches, the Interfaith Shelter became true to its name. It soon acquired and expanded into the entire building and began to offer social services on site.

When the need to provide an evening meal for those in the area was identified the UU church started the Evening Sandwich Program. Initially it ran two late afternoons a week from the downstairs kitchen of the UU church. Donations, USDA Commodity Foods and expired breadstuffs, desert pastries and other foods were donated by local grocery stores. Other church and civic groups used the kitchen to expand the program to five days a week. The location was perfect - right in the middle of town.

I've seen how community service projects can energize a church. I know there are other ideas for the service utilization of UUCC floating around out there. I've heard a few. I think (and hope) I may be seeing steps in this process at UUCC.

Board Meeting - March 9, 2023, 5-7 p.m.

Board Highlights...

> At its March 9 meeting, the Board:

- Learned that 97% of pledges for the current fiscal year have been paid in full and the \$13,000 goal for the Annual Appeal has been exceeded.
- Learned that the church received a \$25,000 unrestricted bequest from the estate of Mark Goldberg.

- Voted to sign a contract with Revision Energy to join the Sandy River Solar Farm.
- Created a work group to take steps to involve the congregation in decisions about our masking policy.
- Discussed the make-up of the Search Committee for our next settled minister. The Board will confirm the committee in May and present the slate to the congregation for affirmation at the Annual Meeting in June.
- Agreed to meet with Buildings and Grounds for advice on sprucing up our buildings before we invite ministerial candidates to visit.
- Received from the Safety Committee a list of 18 concerns and agreed to apply for a grant to address them.
