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A Message from our Minister

Dear Church,

I hope you are doing well. If you need me, I am here for you. Just send me an email or give me a call.

I have been thinking about conflict and how it can destabilize human relations. So many couples, communities, and congregations I know are in conflict. Conflict is not bad. Conflict is inevitable, but hostility is optional. We are souls inhabiting human bodies from ancestral lines who have been through conflict. The good news is that we are alive on this earth today and we would not be here if our ancestors did not survive their conflicts. My question is: How can we thrive, not just survive, through conflict?

Recently, one of my teachers, Daniel Foor, shared his perspective on conflict. He answered my question in four points. The following is my interpretation of his teaching:

- 1. When we live an authentic life and have the intention of being awake and kind in our interactions with the world, we may be seen as provocative. Being out there in the world in this way may surprise people and make them uncomfortable which could possibly draw more conflict to us. Whereas, if we hide, numb out, and not live an intentional life, it is easy to avoid everything including conflict. He talked about the gatekeepers of conflict like Jesus and Siddhartha.
- 2. It is important to know our own threshold of conflict. When we can hold our center and still be our best self in the face of conflict, then staying with the conflict is healthy. But when we get thrown off center or begin behaving in ways that do not express our best self, then we need to move away from the conflict or take a break perhaps returning later.
- 3. How we relate to outer and inner conflict tend to be similar. If we have a hard time with inner messiness, we will not be able to manage messiness around us. We all have different parts to the self. All our parts of us need to have a voice. If they do not, a part may create conflict to be heard or get attention.
- 4. It is not okay to demonize someone you conflict with unless they are truly dangerous. Then you call the cops. Just because we disagree with someone, does not give us the right to annihilate, reject or negate them. We cannot allow our adversaries stop us from seeing the world as whole.

I leave you with some questions: How do you deal with conflict? What parts of you avoid it or are attracted to it. How do you cultivate loving boundaries, compassionate detachment, inclusive discernment? Do you want to be awake? Do you want to be kind? Do you want to live an authentic life? How will wrestling with these questions build the beloved community?

Dear Members and Friends of UUCC,

In this exciting time of renewal of life and energy, we invite you to join us in renewing support for the Reverend Carie Johnsen Social Justice Fund. Our Share the Plate Offering on May 21 will be the yearly opportunity to support this important aspect of our shared ministry. From the time she joined us in August 2009 until May 2021, Reverend Carie showed up over and over again for social justice, leading by example, even when she was in very stressful situations. During the Poor People's Campaign, she was arrested with other clergy as they participated in nonviolent protests. She also spent weeks at Standing Rock, assisting in the ministry to water protectors. She showed up, uncertain of her role, and stood in where needed.

Rev. Carie played a pivotal role in creating and developing Maine Unitarian Universalist State Advocacy Network, a faith-based advocacy network promoting progressive and compassionate social justice legislation in Maine.

As a co-founder of the Capital Area New Mainers Project she also helped inspire our congregation to rent the Drew House to an immigrant family. Others in the congregation have become members of Family Mentor Teams, helping immigrants, refugees, and asylum seekers navigate living in a new community, state, and country.

These are only examples, there are many more social justice actions and stories of her commitment to a fair and just community, country, and world. All of the stories describe dedication, fortitude, and shared leadership.

In appreciation for all we learned about showing up for social justice, the UUCC created the Reverend Carie Johnsen Social Justice Fund. The Maine Community Fund manages the investment which is self-sustaining and allows the congregation to donate at least \$1,000 to a Maine social justice group each year. In the last three years, \$1,000 was given to MUUSAN, Wabanaki Reach, and Capital Area New Mainers Project.

Please help support the Reverend Carie Johnsen Social Justice Fund so that future UUCC members will continue to be inspired by her actions and grassroots organizations in Maine with a social justice focus will get a monetary boost to help fulfill their missions. Please write RCJ SJF on the memo section of your check. The offering of May 21, 2023 will be dedicated to this fund, but we certainly

UPDATE: Saturday Breakfast Ministry

We have been serving breakfast at the UUCC to our unhoused neighbors since January. Most of our guests were spending nights at the South Parish Congregational Church Emergency Low Barrier Overnight Warming Center. The "Center" closed for the season on Monday morning, May 1 at 7 AM during heavy rain. The unhoused were given wagons, tents, sleeping bags, flashlights, and ponchos. Although they are grateful for the camping supplies, there are no legal camp sites in the City of Augusta to set up camp.

The long-term answer is affordable housing. Until then, we can do what we can to create some certainty. We are doing this by continuing to offer Saturday breakfast from 7am-9am every week. Dear Congregation: This is an important update that may be a welcome change for many while others may receive the news with disappointment.

Effective May 1, 2023, the UUCC Church and office building will be mask **optional** environments. Most of you know that this has been a challenging situation since we reopened our Church one year ago. After considering input from the congregation, the Board of Trustees voted unanimously on Thursday, April 13, 2023, to remove the mask requirement. We decided against establishing a section of the Sanctuary exclusively for those who wish to mask because we did not believe, in a building our size, we would achieve any additional health or safety benefits.

We will be supportive of all who continue to mask for whatever the reason and encourage staying home when sick and mask wearing if you have any symptoms that merit doing so.
