Dr. Don on Covid-19

Super-spreaders

Not everyone is equal when it comes to the spreading of infectious disease. It has been established for at least two decades that there is the 20/80 rule. While most infected people will only infect one other person, about one in five infect far more people.

Dr. Robert Amler, the dean of New York Medical College's School of Health Sciences and Practice told FOX Business "The term for these people (or events) is super-spreader. It's more of a colloquial term that epidemiologists and public health workers use to describe a situation where someone in a population or in a community seems to have spread the disease a lot more than most of the others."

The World Health Organization doesn't use the term super-spreader because it "implies that a particular person may be inherently more able than others to pass on disease." Instead, Amler said, "someone could be a super-spreader for a variety of reasons. Because COVID-19 is known to spread through droplets, someone who is sick and who coughs very vigorously and frequently could be a super-spreader because droplets from their cough generate more smaller droplets. Smaller droplets travel farther because gravity doesn't catch them as well. They create a fog or mist at a much greater distance around them... more people are likely to catch this and become infected."

A super-spreader could be someone who has an underlying condition or takes medication that weakens their immune system so they can't get over the infection quickly Amler said. "Other people may be in situations where they encounter lots and lots of people on a regular basis and they can become super-spreaders."


Another mechanism that can create a super-spreader situation is an immune system that is so good that the infected person never develops symptoms and becomes an "asymptomatic spreader". Realistically spread of disease is caused by multiple factors as seen in other epidemic infections including getting a higher dose of the virus in the first place, being infected with more than one disease organism or becoming a constant "carrier" of a disease organism that becomes a normal part of super-spreader systems. "Typhoid Mary" Mallon from a century ago is perhaps the best known super-spreader. We have all seen and heard of current COVID disease spread, including cases here in Maine. One thing seems certain – it is impossible to know who will be a super-spreader and who will not.

Knowing that anyone could become a super-spreader it is important to know how to protect ourselves. The answer to this is again the "three C's" of disease transmission: "closed spaces with poor ventilation, crowded settings, and close contact with others." Avoiding these is our best protection.
