Board Highlights – September 2020

At its meeting on September 10, the Board welcomed new members and voted to:

Correct a minor error in the Annual Budget regarding the salary of the Church Administrator. The adjusted budget also reflects the vote at the Annual Meeting to set aside \$5,000 from the carry over amount for potential expenses related to re-opening the buildings.

Change the signatories on the church accounts at Kennebec Savings Bank to reflect newly elected officers on the Board.

Schedule a congregational meeting with the COVID-19 Advisory Group to get input from the congregation about reopening the buildings.

Authorize Carie to create a committee to define the role and responsibilities of the new position of Lifespan Faith Formation Coordinator.

Disband the Congregational Engagement Working Group and send their final report to the entire congregation. Consider other recommendations of the CEWG at the October Board Meeting.

Authorize Wick Johnson and Catherine Emery to review the Capitol Area New Mainers Project lease and seek guidance from an outside advisor. Bring recommendations to a special Board Meeting on September 24 scheduled to review and approve the lease. Allow Drew House volunteers to assign space in our other two buildings to store material from Drew House.

To Open or Not to Open Conversations with the Board and Ad-hoc Covid-19 Advisory Group

Meeting to be held via Zoom THIS Saturday, Sept. 26 8:30 – 9:30 a.m.

What do we do when there are no clear right answers? In an exercise I did when I was in eighth grade, we were told we had been stranded on the moon and were told to prioritize the resources we had. First we made our lists individually and then as a group. Though this was nearly fifty years ago, the exercise made a lasting impression on me that consensus can bring about a better result than going it alone.

While we are not stranded on the moon, we are faced with a situation that requires decisions—decisions that would best be made with the input of all involved.

The COVID Ad Hoc Group has been meeting regularly since March to discuss how we can maintain safety while still being the busy congregation that we are. While we have used our varied medical and scientific training to make decisions, other questions have been raised that are more philosophical in nature. The COVID Ad Hoc Group referred these philosophical questions to the Board, and now the Board is asking for your input. In a nutshell, what we are grappling with is how and whether we can safely and with equity open our church to some of the activities we are used to participating in.

I know there are members and friends of our congregation who say we should stay closed and virtual and safe, while there are others who say it is time to start safely reopening, and many others between these two extremes.

The Board and the COVID Ad Hoc Group invite you to bring your thoughts, ideas, concerns, hopes and fears to a community ZOOM forum on Saturday, September 26 from 8:30-9:30 (*UUCC ZOOM ROOM*.) If you are unable to attend but want your voice heard, please email or call us. I believe we will be better equipped to navigate these uncharted waters with your input!

Travel during the COVID-19 Pandemic

This week's article is in response to a church member's request. When traveling there is no way to ensure you have zero risk of infection, so it is important to understand the risks and know how to be as safe as possible.

Most viruses don't spread easily on flights because of how efficiently air circulates and is filtered in airplanes. However, crowded flights make social distancing difficult. Keeping the air valve open above your head provides a protective cone of flowing, filtered air around you. Major airlines in the U.S. require that crews and passengers wear cloth face coverings and may require temperature checks before boarding. The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) has increased the cleaning and disinfecting equipment and surfaces at screening checkpoints and made a number of changes to the screening process. You will see TSA officers wearing masks and gloves, practicing social distancing and changing gloves after any pat-down. Instead of handing boarding passes to TSA officers, travelers place passes directly on scanners and then hold them up for inspection. Food items should be transported in a plastic bag and placed in a bin for screening. Separating food from carry-on bags lessens the likelihood that screeners will need to open bags for inspection. Personal items such as keys, wallets and phones should be placed in carry-on bags instead of directly into bins to reduce the handling of these items during screening. Wash hands or use hand sanitizer after screening.

You may need transportation once you arrive at your destination. You can investigate car rental options and their disinfection policies on the internet. If you plan to stay at a hotel, check into shuttle service availability. If you plan to use a ride-hailing service, don't sit in the front seat near the driver. Ask the driver to improve the ventilation in the vehicle if possible by opening the windows or setting the air ventilation/air conditioning on non-recirculation. Consider handling your own bags during pickup and drop-off. When using public transportation limit touching frequently touched surfaces such as kiosks, digital interfaces such as touchscreens and fingerprint scanners, ticket machines, turnstiles, handrails, restroom surfaces, elevator buttons, and benches as much as possible. If you must touch these surfaces, as soon as you can, wash your hands for 20 seconds with soap and water or rub your hands with sanitizer containing 60% alcohol. Avoid gathering in groups, and stay out of crowded spaces when possible, especially at transit stations and stops. Consider skipping a row of seats between yourself and other riders when feasible. If possible, consider traveling during non-peak hours when there are likely to be fewer people.

Travel by private car is the safest, provided those traveling are COVID free. Plan to make as few stops as possible. Be sure to pack cloth face masks, hand sanitizer and disinfectant wipes in an easily accessible spot so that you can use them during the trip. Prepare food and water to take on the trip. Consider including nonperishable items to tide you over if access to restaurants and grocery stores is limited. When you need to get gas, disposable gloves are great but you can use a disinfectant wipe, a paper towel or napkin to hold a gas pump or type on a payment keypad, and throw them away before getting back in your car. After fueling, use hand sanitizer, and when you get to where you're going, use soap and water to wash your hands for at least 20 seconds.

If you choose to pick up a meal on the road, opt for restaurants that offer drive-thru or curbside service. Your safest food options are drive-thru, delivery, take-out, and curbside pick-up. Fast-food restaurants are also the best option for rest room stops. Since most people are opting for takeout or delivery these days, bathrooms in fast-food restaurants are relatively unused. If you rely heavily on restrooms at highway rest areas or gas stations, be especially vigilant with sanitizing. Studies suggest that it's safer to use a paper towel to dry your hands instead of the automatic hand dryer, which can spread particles further. Be careful not to touch fixtures like the faucet or door handle after washing your hands, which would defeat the purpose of hand washing (instead, use a paper towel to shield your hands after washing). And, of course, wear a mask and social distance.

Gov. Mills has issued a "Stay Safer at Home" Order for all Maine people. All out-of-state travelers coming into Maine, and Maine residents returning to Maine, must either receive a negative COVID-19 test within 72 hours prior to arrival or complete a 14-day quarantine, per the Keep Maine Healthy plan. Maine residents can travel to New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut, New Jersey and New York and return without testing or 14-day quarantine because of those state's low level of current infections.

Next week I'll talk about safety during overnight stays in hotels and motels.
