



- Agreed to discuss issues arising from the lack of a Stewardship Chair (as well as the need to recruit a Facilities Chair) at the January meeting.
- Discussed the Congregational Engagement Working Group recommendations and assigned tasks to Board members to pursue the priorities set by the Board.
- Discussed Building and Grounds issues and the need to do renovations.

# Dr. Don on Covid-19

Dr. Don on Covid-19 "Vacca-cination" (vacca, Latin for cow)

COVID-19 vaccines are in the news daily. Before considering them and the complexities of immunization, I pause to pay respect to the first vaccination, developed to prevent smallpox, a major killer of the not too distant past. As proof of the danger being only recently past, the upper arm of many of us older folks have a round scar somewhere around the size of a nickel - evidence of our having received the smallpox vaccine when we were younger.

Edward Jenner is often considered the Father of Vaccination due to his development of the vaccine used to prevent smallpox, a highly infectious disease which infected 60% of the population and often led to the death of 10% of the population and up to 20% in severe epidemics. He is thought to have saved more lives than any other human. Jenner was the son of a vicar and was provided a good basic education, later apprenticed as a surgeon and anatomist and earned his MD from the University of St Andrews in 1792. He returned to his home town of Berkeley, Gloucestershire, England where he was a successful family physician and surgeon.

Jenner had serious interest in zoology which led to his study of animal biology and its role in animal-human disease transmission. It had been known for some years that human infection by cowpox, a minor infection of cattle provided immunity against smallpox, but it was not until Jenner's work that the procedure became widely understood. He saw that milkmaids were generally immune to smallpox and reasoned that the pus in the blisters that milkmaids received from cowpox (a disease similar to smallpox, but far less virulent) protected them from smallpox.

Dr. Jenner performed his first vaccination in 1796 by inoculating James Phipps, an eight-year-old boy who was the son of Jenner's gardener. He scraped pus from cowpox blisters on the hands of Sarah Nelmes, a milkmaid who had caught cowpox from a cow named Blossom, whose hide now hangs on the wall of the St. George's

Medical School library. The importance of this work cannot be over emphasized as it directly led to the discovery of vaccinations as we know them today. His vaccine against smallpox is virtually unchanged to this day and in 1980 led the World Health Organization to declare smallpox an eradicated disease.

To show you how little has changed in other respects I suggest you look up the satirical cartoon "The cow-pock - or - the wonderful effects of the new inoculation" by James Gillray, published in 1802 by the Anti-Vaccine Society, or the statue in Rome of Jenner vaccinating his very reluctant son.
