

December 2020 Board Highlights: At its December 10th meeting, the Board...

- Approved a motion to acknowledge the minister's housing allowance which has no impact on the church budget but has tax implications for the Minister.
- Celebrated earnings from the Holiday Fair and Hannaford card program and discussed hopes for the upcoming year-end annual appeal.
- Agreed to discuss issues arising from the lack of a Stewardship Chair (as well as the need to recruit a Facilities Chair) at the January meeting.
- Discussed the Congregational Engagement Working Group recommendations and assigned tasks to Board members to pursue the priorities set by the Board.
- Discussed Building and Grounds issues and the need to do renovations.

COVID-19 Vaccines

More than 150 coronavirus vaccines are in development across the world; a little over a handful have been approved by individual countries including two for use in the U.S. Reading through the list I found projects underway by corporations, health centers, universities, governments and combinations of these groups cooperating together, many working together internationally.

The candidates, like all vaccines, essentially aim to instruct the immune system to mount a defense, which is often stronger than what would be provided through natural infection and comes with fewer health consequences. To do so, some vaccines use the whole COVID virus, but in a killed or weakened state. Others use only part of the virus, whether a protein or a fragment. Some transfer the coronavirus proteins into a different virus that is unlikely or incapable of causing disease. Finally, some vaccines like the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines in use in the U.S. rely on deploying pieces of COVID-19 genetic material, which our cells can temporarily use to make COVID-19 proteins which stimulate our own immune defense systems.

It can typically take many years to bring a vaccine to market. The vaccine for mumps was previously the quickest in development taking four years in the 1960s. Vaccines go through a multi-stage clinical trial process which starts by checking their safety and whether they trigger an immune response in a small group of healthy humans. The second phase widens the testing pool to include groups of people who may have the disease or are likely to catch it, to determine vaccine effectiveness. The third phase expands testing to a pool of thousands to make sure the vaccine is safe and effective among a wider array of people, since immune response can vary by age, ethnicity, or by underlying health conditions. It then goes to regulatory agencies for approval, often a lengthy process itself.

COVID-19 vaccine development has compressed the process by running clinical trial phases simultaneously, mass producing vaccine early and pre planning its distribution. This has been done with the promise of U.S. Food and Drug Administration fast-tracking the approval process. Emergency Use Authorization was approved for the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines within the past two weeks.

Has this quick vaccine development compromised safety? A number of factors enter here. First and foremost, money has not been an issue, and frankly a number of other medical projects have been sidelined. Also a large pool of willing participants has been available to medical researchers. The technology being utilized is well understood assuring the immune response to the vaccine. While no vaccine ever produces 100% positive response, the quality of the work in developing the vaccines being employed in this country, the UK and Germany (by other research groups) is impressive.
