



Jan 2021 Board Notes

At its January meeting, the Board:

- Heard from the Finance Committee that halfway through the fiscal year, income is up and expenses are down. We are in good financial shape.
- Voted to pursue a second Payroll Protection Program grant if we are eligible.
- Heard a report from the Personnel Work Group which has been updating our Personnel Handbook in accordance with the UUA Handbook. Voted to accept the updated handbook as amended.
- Voted to sign onto a draft Statement of Conscience from the UUA "Undoing Intersectional White Supremacy: A Call to Prophetic Action", with the approval of the Social Justice Committee.
- Heard recommendations for building renovations.
- Agreed to proceed with two recommendations stemming from the Congregational Engagement Working Group: 1) Initiate "What's on your mind?" sessions with the congregation starting in February and 2) Explore "Beginning Anew" as a potential practice for conflict resolution.

Dr. Don on Covid-19

Dr. Don on COVID-19 COVID "Long-Haulers"

If you are still "on the fence" regarding COVID-19 vaccinations, here is one more reason to be immunized.

Over 75% of people hospitalized with COVID-19 still report symptoms 6 months later. A new study published last month in The Lancet found the more sick a person was with COVID-19, the greater their risk of experiencing persistent symptoms months later. Even mild cases in the very young have been linked to lasting symptoms that can be extremely serious. Doctors suspect the risk factors include genetics, inflammation, and abnormal immune responses. Scientists have learned a great deal about COVID-19 in record time, but because COVID-19 has only been around for a year we're just now starting to see that COVID-19 doesn't always disappear when

the infection clears up. In some cases the infection triggers serious long-term physical and neurological health effects.


Yale Medicine, like a number of other hospitals, has opened a clinic specifically tailored to post-COVID-19 complications. "All too commonly, we are seeing patients with shortness of breath, fatigue, chronic pain, memory issues, and depression," said Dr. Jean Paul Higuero-Sevilla, a physician at Yale Medicine who works in the Post-COVID-19 Recovery Program. Lingering symptoms are present in people of all ages and not only in those who had severe COVID-19, but after mild cases, too. "Some of our patients were diagnosed with COVID during the first wave of the pandemic and are still dealing with long-term health consequences," Higuero-Sevilla said. Many of these people experience neurological issues, so Yale opened a second clinic, called NeuroCOVID, for people with symptoms involving the brain and nerves. "These include a fairly wide variety of symptoms, including problems with memory and concentration, unremitting headaches, abnormal sensations on the skin, prolonged loss of smell and taste, and difficult symptoms of new or worsened anxiety and depression," said Dr. Serena Spudich, a Yale Medicine neurologist, who runs the NeuroCOVID clinic.

It now seems clear that in "long-haulers" COVID-19 can have a devastating impact on people's ability to carry on with their daily lives.
