

These are quick acknowledgements that your request has been received and that they will be in touch to schedule when vaccine is available. This is a quick courtesy contact and no information is requested, which should make these easy to differentiate from scam calls.

A Note from Maine General about a **SCAM** around Vaccines:

We have read the local and national reports that there is a COVID-19 vaccination scam that asks for social security numbers and/or credit card information to set up an appointment to receive a COVID-19 vaccine. **If you get a call like this hang up immediately.** We want you to know that when MaineGeneral calls you to schedule a COVID-19 vaccination appointment we will NOT ask you for

this information. We will confirm the health insurance information we have on file and ask which dates you are available to receive the first and second dose vaccine. Jan 2021 Board Notes

At its January meeting, the Board:

- Heard from the Finance Committee that halfway through the fiscal year, income is up and expenses are down. We are in good financial shape.
- Voted to pursue a second Payroll Protection Program grant if we are eligible.
- Heard a report from the Personnel Work Group which has been updating our Personnel Handbook in accordance with the UUA Handbook. Voted to accept the updated handbook as amended.
- Voted to sign onto a draft Statement of Conscience from the UUA "Undoing Intersectional White Supremacy: A Call to Prophetic Action", with the approval of the Social Justice Committee.
- Heard recommendations for building renovations.
- Agreed to proceed with two recommendations stemming from the Congregational Engagement Working Group: 1) Initiate "What's on your mind?" sessions with the congregation starting in February and 2) Explore "Beginning Anew" as a potential practice for conflict resolution.

COVID-19 Advisory Group Message

As we near the one year anniversary of the COVID-19 pandemic, it is useful to take stock of how much it has impacted our lives. It has been 11 months since the last time we came together in person as a congregation, shared a meal with each other or were able to give each other a hug. During that time, the United States has seen more than 27 million cases and lost nearly 465,000 people, the State of Maine has reported over 41,600 cases and 640 deaths. We have all become adept at wearing masks, using hand sanitizer, avoiding crowds and have developed a sixth sense of what six feet looks and feels like. Some of us are in the process of receiving the most rapidly developed, amazingly safe & effective vaccine in human history.

Except for Dr. Don Naber's wonderful articles, the COVID-19 Advisory Group has been conspicuously silent in the E-blast over the past month and a half. That has been due to the steady surge of new cases throughout Maine since the Thanksgiving holiday. Public health experts warned that people letting down their guard and gathering with family and friends during the holidays would result in a huge increase in cases, hospitalizations and deaths. Unfortunately, they were absolutely correct; well over half of the total cases & deaths in the United States have occurred since Thanksgiving.

Last fall, the COVID-19 Advisory Group established an upper limit of 8 new COVID cases per 10,000 Mainers as a metric to allow in-person small group gatherings. As of this week that number is 102, nearly 13 times that upper limit metric.

COVID-19 is still very much a reality in Maine and Kennebec county and we all need to continue following recommended safety guidelines, including anytime we wish to enter UUCC facilities. Anyone desiring entry needs to request permission from the COVID-19 Advisory Group, follow the Guidelines and complete a Checklist during their time in our facilities.

Please continue to protect yourselves and your loved ones. We want to have everyone available to celebrate when we are finally able to come together again.

COVID-19 and the Kidneys

It has been known since relatively early in the COVID-19 pandemic that those with certain underlying disease conditions are at greater risk from COVID infection. Chronic kidney disease is one of those conditions that can result in severe infection from the virus. People on dialysis often have weaker immune systems, making it harder to fight infections. Individuals with a kidney transplant take anti-rejection drugs (also known as immunosuppressive medicines). They work by keeping the immune system less active, which can make it harder to fight infections. Not surprisingly COVID can thrive in these situations.

We now know that COVID infection in those previously healthy can lead to very serious kidney disease. A report from New York's Mount Sinai Health System shows that people hospitalized with COVID-19 are at significant risk of acute kidney injury (AKI), which can lead to serious illness, dialysis, and even death. The study

found patients with COVID-19 were more than twice as likely to develop AKI as compared to non-COVID patients who developed AKI. AKI appears to be a marker of COVID-19 infection severity and its mortality rate is higher.

Various COVID-19-related effects that are thought to contribute to AKI include kidney tubule injury with septic shock, microinflammation, increased blood clotting, and direct infection of the kidney by the virus. Most patients with COVID-19-related AKI who recover continue to have low kidney function after discharge from the hospital. Some will need dialysis and unfortunately will become candidates for kidney transplant due to kidney failure.

In a statement, the National Kidney Foundation (NKF) reported that acute kidney injury is occurring in 15% of all patients who are hospitalized for COVID-19, and many of these patients end up needing dialysis. When a COVID-19 patient reaches intensive care, the odds increase that the person will lose kidney function — and the NKF says that some hospitals have found themselves in short supply of dialysis equipment or staff trained to administer this level of care in the ICU.

"A significant number of patients going into the hospital to be treated for COVID-19 are coming out as kidney patients," Kevin Longino, CEO of the National Kidney Foundation and also a kidney transplant recipient, said in a statement. "We believe this may be a looming healthcare crisis that will put a greater strain on hospitals, dialysis clinics and patients for whom chronic kidney disease will be a lasting remnant of the Coronavirus crisis."

Despite improvements in COVID treatment which have increased positive patient outcomes, the increasing need for long term kidney disease care grows.
