


**Read. learn. Share** meets Thursday May 6 at noon in the UUCC Zoom Room.

#### EMBODY OUR PRINCIPLES WITH MUUSAN

Casual observers of the legislature often breathe a sigh of relief or have a celebration when a bill passes after our hard work. Then we take our eye off the ball and fail to notice that the bill seems to have disappeared and not actually been enacted. There is a reason for this, and it could happen with the bill to institute ON-LINE VOTER REGISTRATION. There is support to make registering to vote easier and general acknowledgement that it will save the state money in the long run.

However, there will be cost involved in implementing the bill. Therefore, if the bill passes it will be sent to the Appropriations Committee so it can be considered for funding. The members of the Appropriations Committee members look at all of the bills before them and at the money available in the budget and make decisions about what will and will not be funded. Many a good idea does not make it out of this process.

MUUSAN will be keeping track of the On-Line Voter Registration bill through all of this and will let us know if we need to make a push to contact members of the Appropriations Committee to urge them to fund this bill. Maine has been a leader in voter participation in the country, and pushing this bill over the finish line will help us maintain that leadership. Stay tuned...

# **Board of Trustees**

#### Questions and Answers from Zoom Meeting "What's On Your Mind" held on April 11, 2021

#### Q: Did the board consider the possibility of NOT having a full-time minister?

**A:** The interim minister will be hired on a full-time basis. If our fiscal year ended today, we might have \$15,000 left over funds from last year, in part from PPP grant income. We cut snow removal costs this year by switching providers and we no longer pay heating or electricity costs at the Drew House. We receive rental income from the Drew House monthly. The Finance Committee is vigilant at looking how we can keep our expenses in line. People have been good at paying pledges. Although 75% of the year has transpired, 83% of pledges have been paid for this year. Our first draft of next year's budget will come to the board in May. The budget concerns are justified, but it feels this way every spring. We need to get our numbers up. The church is in a stronger position than it has ever been, but that does not mean we don't have to be careful. The Endowment and Ballard Trust are generating more income than in the past. We are committed to hiring a full-time minister.

## Q: Carie had a paid Sabbatical coming. Is she entitled to that payment?

A: No, because she resigned, she is not eligible for a Sabbatical.

## Q: Is the church leadership focusing on the need to continue healing?

A: Yes. Both the Board and the Committee on Ministry continues to focus on the health of the church community.

#### Q: Who is the Summer Minister?

**A:** Bettina Lehovec, who has been an intern with Ellsworth, Castine and Belfast will work as the UUCC contract minister this summer from May 17 – Aug. 1.

## Q: Will there be any lay led services this summer?

**A:** The technology is so complex, the Worship Committee did not want to take on that responsibility.

## Q. Are services being recorded?

**A:** Yes, inquire of our Church Administrator, Lynn Smith. Carie reviews each video and edits it before posting. You should know how much our Minister does outside of Service on Sunday.

## Q: Are we aware of why we're losing membership, if we are?

A: A few members left the church since the last conflict. It's difficult to gauge membership while we're doing church on zoom. We don't know how many people will return when we have in-person service. It is encouraging that those who pledged last year are keeping up with their pledges. I don't always say to others, "Why not join us?" which more of us need to do. Churches in general are getting smaller. Families aren't joining as much. Times have changed. The good news is that with all these unknown factors, a year from now, we'll have a more accurate idea of how it's going. It's not likely that we will put ourselves at risk, financially speaking. We will do what is responsible.

## Q: What is happening next Friday, April 16<sup>th</sup>?

**A:** The Committee on Ministry will create an experience of shared ministry of 12 years (not all about Rev. Carie, but about all of us with Rev. Carie). How can we have people's stories exist in something lasting that Carie and we could keep? Someone will draw images in art as we share.

## Q: Have we invited anyone outside our church to Carie's farewell service?

**A:** We could have a "walkabout" so Carie can participate in stories of the past. Interfaith people will be included in our farewells. The church has been fiscal agent for MUUSAN, they might want to be included.

# Dr. Don on Covid-19

Dr. Don on COVID-19 Blood Clots and the J & J vaccine

I was volunteering at a COVID-19 vaccination clinic when one of my fellow volunteers told me that the CDC had called for a "pause" in the administration of the Johnson and Johnson COVID vaccine. This pause, in the words of Dr. Anne Schuchat, Principal Deputy Director of the CDC and Dr. Peter Marks, director of the FDA's Center for Biologics Evaluation and Research, is "out of an abundance of caution" after six reported U.S. cases and one death of a rare and severe type of blood clot in individuals given the J&J vaccine. Maine CDC is following the national recommendation.

All six clotting cases occurred among women between the ages of 18 and 48, 6 to 13 days after vaccination. Usual treatment with an anticoagulant drug called heparin may be dangerous in these cases and alternative treatments need to be given.

"It's a low frequency problem but with potentially big consequences for the vaccine program if not put into the proper context," said Dr. Arnold Monto, acting chair of an FDA vaccine advisory committee. Monto said people might not understand that the other two vaccines being used in the US, made by Pfizer and Moderna, are designed differently, and those vaccines have not been linked to blood clots. "My concern is that people don't understand there are different vaccine platforms," Monto said and that's why communication is key. "There could be consequences in terms of the messaging," he continued. "We can't let this be handled by the politicians, it's got to be handled by the scientists."

The US is spending billions of dollars on three different types of vaccines, and that's by design. "There are a number of different platforms that are being pursued so that we don't have all of our eggs in one basket," Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases told a congressional panel last year. The J & J vaccine is a "vector vaccine", it uses an altered version of another virus to carry genetic instructions to make the coronavirus spike protein that activates immunity. AstraZeneca's vaccine is also a vector vaccine, and there have been cases of the same type of blood clots, prompting AstraZeneca rollout pauses in Europe.

These pauses show the US was smart, as Fauci put it, to not put all their eggs into one basket. "It proves there was a lot of wisdom in that approach," said Dr. Nelson Michael, director of the Center for Infectious Diseases Research at the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research. "I'm glad we have six different vaccines derived from three different platforms in play."

The second platform is mRNA, which is being used by Pfizer and Moderna. Novavax and Sanofi are using a third platform, called protein subunit vaccines, and they have not yet applied to the FDA for emergency use authorization. It's possible AstraZeneca will never be used in the US, and also that the pause on the J&J rollout could be long term, or its use limited to only some age groups. "We hope that we don't get both adenovirus vector vaccines knocked out because of safety concerns, that would be terrible. But it's not like the world doesn't have a plan B, and that plan B would be to rely more on protein vaccines and mRNA vaccines," Michael said.

As I write this the CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization (ACIP) is scheduled to hold a meeting today, Wednesday to analyze the cases. It will not surprise me if the group finds that a rare phenomenon previously seen with other vaccines and medications is present in some individuals that triggers these clots. I am concerned that misinformation, public hesitation and the possible lack of vaccine or its use will lead to more outbreaks of dangerous, new variant viruses.
