

<u>The Social Justice Committee</u> (Michaela Loisel and Debbie Mattson as co-chairs, Hilary Nickels and Pam Lombard as members) is promoting the adoption of the 8th principle by UUCC, Augusta. This is part of a grassroots movement promoted by Black Lives UUs.

The 8th principle is: "We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

The Unitarian Universalist Association adopted the existing Seven Principles in 1985.

The development and promotion of the 8th principle is in response to issues of hiring within the UUA; the recognition that most UU congregations are primarily European-American in membership, culture and leadership, even when located near diverse communities; and the urgency to dismantle white supremacy/racism within ourselves, our congregations, and communities.

Beacon Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Summit, New Jersey adopted the 8th principal. Rev. Dr. Robin Tanner, one of the church's minister, said that "by joining with other leading UU congregations across the country, we hope to convince our denomination to add these 8th Principle pledges to our core set of practices. This Principle goes to the heart of our mission—to be radically inclusive, to feed the human spirit and heal the world."

The Social Justice Committee of the UUCC is developing a plan to engage our congregation in conversation about the need for the 8th principle. We will ask for a special congregational meeting within a year to vote on its adoption. If we adopt the 8th principle we will join a growing number of UU congregations with an 8th principle. We will continue to advocate the need for the UUA adopt it as well.

Experts Urge COVID Vaccination of Teens

Health experts are urging parents to vaccinate their teenagers against COVID-19 after a report published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention showed hospitalizations increased in the months leading up to the vaccine's authorization for those 12 and up. The agency found hospitalization rates among adolescents 12 to 17 increased from March 1 to April 24 after declining in January and February. The study found more than 30% of teen patients were admitted to the intensive care unit and nearly 5% required mechanical ventilation. Teen hospitalization rates from March 1 to April 24 were still about 12.5 times lower than adults 18 and older but higher among adolescents than children between the ages of 5 and 11.

CDC Director Dr. Rochelle Walensky said in a statement Friday she was "deeply concerned" and "saddened" by the report's findings. "Much of this suffering can be prevented," she said. "I ask parents, relatives and close friends to join me and talk with teens ... and encourage them to get vaccinated." Walensky urged teens to continue following public health recommendations until they become fully vaccinated. "Until they are fully vaccinated, adolescents should continue to wear masks and take precautions when around others who are not vaccinated, to protect themselves, and their family, friends, and community," she said.

The Food and Drug Administration authorized use of the COVID-19 vaccine developed by Pfizer on May 10 for children 12 and older. Both the mRNA vaccine by Moderna and the single-shot vaccine by Johnson & Johnson are currently authorized for adults 18 and older. Moderna reported May 25 its vaccine has been shown in trials to be safe and effective for children as young as 12 and will ask for FDA authorization for its broadened use this month.

In Maine, Dr. Nirav Shah, director of the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention, told reporters during a press briefing that messaging on the vaccine for teenagers requires nuance.

"Much of our messaging has been directed to patients," he said. "But here, we have to speak not only to the

[teens], but also their parents and guardians to make the case [for vaccination]."

He said the conversation on adolescent and teen vaccines has centered around hesitancy. "The same approach that we've been taking with adult vaccinations applies here, which is to say some parents are extremely eager to get their kids vaccinated. Some parents and other groups are motivated by convenience, but that group has a lot of questions that they want answered first," he said.

Requiring vaccination to attend school is a question that varies across states. In Maine, Shah said it's not yet clear if schools would require students to be vaccinated before returning to class although some higher education institutions in Maine say they will be requiring vaccines.
