Covid-19 Advisory Group UPDATE

At their June 10, 2021 meeting, the UUCC Board of Trustees approved the policy on the next page allowing groups of twelve (12) or fewer people, wearing masks, to meet indoors, in-person in UUCC facilities.

The COVID-19 Advisory Group and the Board are working on a policy that will allow us to resume in-person church services this coming autumn. We are not resuming in-person services this summer because that was not a part of our contract with our summer minister. Due to recent significant upgrades to the technology systems in our sanctuary and fellowship hall, we will be offering both in-person and live streamed Sunday morning services when we reopen.

A sub-committee of the Board and the COVID-19 Advisory Group studied the issue of creating separate guidelines for vaccinated and unvaccinated individuals, but ultimately decided against such a proposal for the following reasons:

- It was not in alignment with our UU principles focusing upon the equal inclusion of all members
- It would be intrusive and violate each individual's right to privacy about their medical decisions
- It would result in an unenforceable policy.

We are requiring all attendees to in-person, indoor gatherings to wear facial coverings and maintain physical distancing for the following reasons:

- While they are incredibly effective, no COVID-19 vaccine can prevent 100% of COVID infections
- There are members of our congregation who are unable to be vaccinated for a variety of reasons
- Many members of our congregation are at higher risk of incomplete protection from the vaccines due to underlying medical conditions, medications and age
- Our primary goal is to ensure the safety of everyone who enters our facilities. We take care of each other because we care about each other.

Use of spaces Policy

Beginning in February, 2020 SARS Cov-2, the coronavirus that causes COVID-19 has been present in Maine. It is a microscopic particle that is spread from person to person attached to tiny respiratory droplets or saliva. Some of these droplets are so small that they can remain suspended in the air as an aerosol for prolonged periods of time. These droplets are released when an infected person coughs, sneezes, sings or talks. Since early 2021, three (3) remarkably safe and effective vaccines have been available and Maine has one of the best rates of vaccination in the country. These vaccines are between 75-94% effective in preventing any COVID-19 infections in fully vaccinated individuals. More importantly, all three (3) are 99.96% effective in preventing serious COVID infection (the need for: hospitalization, ICU care, ventilator support or death). Currently, all people twelve (12) years of age and older are eligible for COVID vaccination.

Despite the overwhelming success of the vaccination programs, it is important to recognize that there are members of our community who are immunosuppressed due to medications for underlying medical conditions. There is strong evidence that some of these individuals will not receive protection from being vaccinated. There are others who are unable to be vaccinated (for a variety of reasons). We are a community that cares about each other and strives to take care of each other. Therefore, we must all continue to take simple precautions to protect our friends and the valued members of our community.

Following a prolonged winter/spring spike in COVID-19 infections, Maine is seeing a dramatic reduction in infections, hospitalizations and deaths. This is primarily the result of widespread vaccination across the state.

As a result of the effectiveness of the vaccines and reduced number of COVID cases in Maine, the UUCC COVID-19 Advisory Group recommends that groups of twelve (12) or fewer people can meet indoors in UUCC facilities following these guidelines:

- If you have any cold or flu-like symptoms, DO NOT attend in-person gatherings
- Appropriate facial coverings (covering both mouth and nose) must be worn at all times and in all areas of the facility
- Maintain six (6) feet of physical distancing between individuals who are not household members
- No eating or drinking while indoors (requires removal of facial covering)
- No singing or wind instruments
- Weather permitting, please open all windows and doors to improve ventilation
- Please remember to close the windows at the end of the gathering
- Please do not run the ceiling fans as they may increase the risk of aerosol spread
- All meeting are to be scheduled through the church administrator
- Only one meeting may take place during any time slot

• Group leaders are responsible for filling out a *Checklist for Groups Using UUCC Facilities* and leaving it in the drop box in the Committee Room. This checklist includes a listing of all participants and contact information in case contact tracing becomes necessary.

The COVID-19 Advisory Group will continue to monitor Maine CDC COVID metrics and these guidelines are subject to review and may be changed or rescinded as necessary to ensure the safety of all members of the UUCC community.

- The Board was updated on the church campus renovations plans by Wick Johnson. The renovations are almost complete, and many kudos were sent to the renovations crew, another invaluable group. Wick was also thanked for continually keeping us up to date as the project progressed.
- Kathy Kellison, chair of the Committee on Ministry (CoM) reported to us on a New England UUA meeting focused on covenanting that all CoM members had attended. CoM and the Board will work further with the congregation on developing a congregational covenant; long overdue.
- Last, but not least, outgoing board members, Jill Watson, Wick Johnson, Catherine Palmer and Susan Caldwell were thanked for their wonderful service in their roles on the Board. Testimonials were made and many virtual hugs and kisses sent!

Dr. Don on COVID-19 A Primer on COVID-19 Mutations and Variants

Mutations occur when genetic information changes, altering future generations, be they virus, cells or the organism produced from the cells. In nature the hard fact is that the majority of mutations are lethal. To be clear, mutations are also what allow organisms to better survive as the chief "tool" of evolution. A frequently cited example occurred in the industrial UK where coal smoke darkened surfaces hid darker moths which flourished while lighter colored moths were easily spotted and eaten by birds.

Because of their fragile genetic codes all viruses acquire mutations as they replicate, and COVID-19 is no exception. Many of these mutations are damaging resulting in the virus failing to reproduce, others have no impact at all. But some change the virus's structure or function. Identifying changes in the genetic codes of a virus is simple. Figuring out how those changes impact the way a virus spreads is trickier.

To infect cells, COVID-19 must enter the body and bind to receptors on the surface of cells. The virus is studded with mushroom-shaped spike proteins that latch onto a receptor called ACE2 found on many human cell types, including those that line the lungs. Think of it like a key fitting into a lock.

Mutations that help the virus bind more tightly can make transmission from one person to another easier. Imagine you breathe in a droplet that contains COVID-19. If that droplet contains viruses with better binding capabilities, they "will be more efficient at finding and infecting one of your cells," says Nathaniel Landau, a microbiologist at NYU Grossman School of Medicine.

Landau and his colleagues study binding in the lab by mixing lab created COVID-19 virus attachment spikes with plastic beads covered with ACE2 and then work out how much virus sticks to the beads. Landau and his colleagues have shown that some of the spike mutations do enhance binding. Because the virus is better at grabbing ACE2, it will infect more cells inside the body. "The infected person will have more virus in them, because the virus is replicating more efficiently," Landau says.

After the virus binds to ACE2, it forces enzymes from the infected cell to cut attached virus spikes at two different sites, a process known as cleavage. This allows the virus genes to enter and take over the cell, forcing it to make more virus. If binding is like the key fitting in the lock, cleavage is like the key turning the deadbolt and opening the door. "Without cuts at both sites, the virus can't get into cells," says Vineet Menachery, a virologist at The University of Texas Medical Branch. One of the mutations present in the new Delta variant enhances the cleavage process. "So it's a little bit easier for the virus to be activated," says Menachery.

Thus far there are three Delta variants and some of these Delta mutations could help the virus evade the body's immune responses. Immune evasion means more cells become infected and produce more virus, which then potentially makes it easier for a person carrying that virus to both become infected and infect others.

The good news is that full vaccination provides strong protection against current variants. The effectiveness of one dose of either the two dose Moderna or Pfizer vaccines was much lower—just 33%.
