A Message from the Minister

This last week I enjoyed a visit from my mom, who lives in Virginia. We explored Harpswell and Phippsburg. We had a nice hike to the summit of Merritt Mountain and seafood chowder at Uncle Pete's Community Market. While driving around, I was reminded of how much I love maps. I love looking at the formation of the land, the different routes, and all the little parks and stops along the way. Maps are helpful and beautiful.

I completed my interim ministry training from the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) this month. Often, in a training like that, we want a map. We didn't get a map. I'm reminded of a member of my last church who asked "didn't they give you a big book telling the church what to do?" I am sorry to say there isn't a big book. There is no map, no manual. Instead we have process tasks or steps. I will mention them regularly, and the first one is **coming to terms with history**. It is up to us, the congregation in partnership with me, to figure out how we do these steps. The transition team (see the forthcoming November newsletter with information about them) will be guiding us through these steps and will be collecting information along the way. The transition team is our cartographers; drawing and updating the map of UUCC as we explore our history and our identity.






Annual Leaf Raking - Sat. Nov 6th at 9:30 am

What's On Your Mind?

Oct. 3, 2021, was the first fall session of conversation with those interested with talking with UUCC Board members. A small group gathered, and lively conversations were shared. The following issues were discussed in some detail and the board was informed of the questions and suggestions at the meeting held on Oct. 14.

1. Rental of Drew House: The questioner asked if when the current tenants move out would the house then be rented to someone in the public not CANMP? Harry responded that this lease agreement with

CANMP would continue with a new tenant family which supports our values of justice in housing for those who need it. CANMP is the "landlord" who works with the family. We have raised the rent from \$800.00 to \$1000.00 to cover the church expenses.

- 2. Communication and technology at UUCC: Some of the challenges we have with technology and that Lynn deals with were mentioned. The technology Workgroup meets regularly and is investigating needs and possible fixes. They will have a report for the Feb. Board meeting to share their findings. The E-Blast publication was discussed and ideas for changes such as formatting, order of items in the e-blast, and timing were mentioned.
- 3. Church finances: How are we doing financially? Martha thanked all for pledging and paying those pledges in these unusual times. The program expenses are very low since we cannot yet gather together. We have a healthy balance in our operating account at this time.

Update from COVID-19 Advisory Group

The plan for reopening UUCC for in-person, indoor gatherings approved by the Board on August 12, 2021 depends on the COVID-19 pandemic being under control in our state and county. The Delta variant of the virus (now widely circulating in Maine) is primarily affecting unvaccinated individuals, but some fully vaccinated folks are being infected and a few are getting very sick despite immunization.

The Board adopted a Maine CDC metric that measures "community (person to person) transmission" of the virus. We are closely monitoring this metric for both our county and the entire state (since the virus does not pay attention to county lines on the map). We sought expert advice from an infectious disease specialist and have set an upper safe limit of 10 new cases of COVID-19 per 10,000 people based upon the 14 day average. *If either county or state are over 10, it is not safe for us to reopen.* This data is published by the Maine CDC every Thursday morning (see below for how to access this information for yourself).

The necessary CDC metric for us to reopen is no more than 10 new cases per 10,000 people. The present CDC metric data means that there is currently too much COVID-19 activity for us to safely reopen.

Dr. Don on Covid-19

Dr. Don on COVID-19 Focus on Kids (mostly)

The Washington Post reports that parents of children eager for trick-or-treating can breathe a sigh of relief: Top federal health officials appear united in their belief that the Halloween tradition is exceedingly safe. On "Fox News Sunday," Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Director Rochelle Walensky encouraged kids to "put on those costumes, stay outside and enjoy your trick-or-treating." Her comments echo remarks from An-thony S. Fauci, the government's top infectious-disease expert, who said celebrating Halloween outdoors will be particularly safe for vaccinated children.

For now, most children younger than 12 remain unvaccinated by necessity, but that will soon change. An FDA advisory panel Tuesday authorized the Pfizer vaccine for use in children 5 to 11. Pfizer released reports showing that their coronavirus vaccine was 91 percent effective in a trial of about 4,500 children. There were no in-stances of heart inflammation after the shots, which are one-third the size adults and adolescents receive. Three steps remain before it would be available to children: the FDA will have to sign off, an independent CDC advisory panel will review the data, and then the CDC director would have to sign off. All this will probably occur this week, or early next week.

The Moderna vaccine for kids ages 6 through 11 shows a "robust" immune response, the Massachusetts-based company said Monday, following child vaccine trials. Moderna said it plans to submit the data to the FDA "in the near term." The randomized study involved a two-dose vaccine that is half the dosage of the adult vaccine. The majority of adverse events were mild or moderate in severity, the company said, and the most common were fatigue, headache, fever and injection site pain. Also at this point the FDA still hasn't announced a decision on Moderna's vaccine for youths ages 12 through 17.

The Auburn clinic I volunteer for and pharmacies elsewhere have experienced a rush of booster seekers follow-ing federal approval of Johnson & Johnson and Moderna boosters. Pfizer boosters were approved earlier. Many Johnson & Johnson recipients were keen to have a booster from Pfizer or Moderna, because studies have shown that the mRNA vaccines may be more protective than their initial vaccine.
