The hymn ends with these words "discern in us our richest hues, show us the patterns we may use to set our spirits free." Lovely words! May we find the patterns we may use to set our spirits free!





Update from COVID-19 Advisory Group

The plan for reopening UUCC for in-person, indoor gatherings approved by the Board on August 12, 2021 depends on the COVID-19 pandemic being under control in our state and county. The Board adopted a Maine CDC metric that measures "community (person to person) transmission" of the virus. The necessary CDC metric for us to reopen is no more than 10 new cases per 10,000 people in Kennebec County or the State of Maine.

The most recent Maine CDC data: Published on November 4, 2021

The present CDC metric data indicates that it is still unsafe for us to safely reopen.

Dr. Don on COVID-19 'We're going in the wrong direction'

Data released this past week has shown that New Hampshire and Vermont are the first and third ranking states in the country for the largest number of average daily new cases per 100,000 people. Although Maine is further back in the statistical pack, the highest daily new case totals, intensive care bed utilization and ventilator use are occurring right now. The graphs of these numbers confirm this, showing a wider, taller curve larger than those of the previous year and a half. As we enter the season of cold weather when we get together in close proximity with each other, I am concerned.

On July 25 of this past summer Dr. Anthony Fauci said that the US is "going in the wrong direction" as the number of Covid-19 cases continued to rise. "So it really is, as (US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) Dr. (Rochelle) Walensky has said many times and I have said, it is really a pandemic among the unvaccinated, so this is an issue predominantly among the unvaccinated, which is the reason why we're out there, practically pleading with the unvaccinated people to go out and get vaccinated," he said.

The vaccines have proved so powerful, and the partisan attitudes toward them so different, that a gap in COVID's toll has quickly emerged and grown faster over the past month in Maine than at any previous point. This situation is a tragedy, in which irrational fears about vaccine side effects have overwhelmed rational fears about a deadly virus. It stems from disinformation promoted by right-wing media, and extremely well paid commentators who prey on public distrust created by other professional outrage creators. Science and Medicine are complex, changing, often not easily understood, slow to develop and not perfect, all characteristics being utilized to sow this distrust and disinformation.

The future of COVID is uncertain, but I have hope. I hope the partisan gap in COVID cases and deaths has reached its peak. As reported by the New York Times last week there are two main reasons to expect the gap may soon shrink. One, the new antiviral medications from Pfizer and Merck seem likely to reduce serious COVID and deaths everywhere, and especially where they are most common. Hopefully these treatments, along with the vaccines, may eventually turn this coronavirus into just another manageable virus. Two, hopefully conservative America is building up natural immunity to COVID from prior infections due to the hostility to vaccination and social distancing allowing the virus to spread more widely. A buildup in natural immunity may be one reason that the partisan gap in new COVID cases has shrunk in other parts of the country recently.

Nobody knows what will happen next. The declines in caseloads elsewhere is mysterious, which means it may not last. Also it is clear the immunity from vaccination appears to be much stronger than the immunity from infection, meaning that those vaccine hesitant conservative Americans will probably continue to suffer an outsized amount of unnecessary illness and death.
