

## **COVID-19 Updates / News**

#### **Update from COVID-19 Advisory Group**

The plan for reopening UUCC for in-person, indoor gatherings approved by the Board on August 12, 2021 depends on the COVID-19 pandemic being under control in our state and county. The Board adopted a Maine CDC metric that measures "community (person to person) transmission" of the virus.

The necessary CDC metric for us to reopen is no more than 10 new cases per 10,000 people in Kennebec County or the State of Maine.



The present CDC metric data indicates that it is still unsafe for us to safely reopen.

### Dr. Don on Covid-19

Dr. Don on COVID 19 Ventilator Use In Treating COVID

A ventilator mechanically helps pump oxygen into your body. The air flows through a tube that goes in your mouth and down your trachea. The ventilator also may breathe out for you, or you may do it on your own. A ventilator is utilized when the patient is too exhausted to continue breathing on their own or their efforts are insufficient to meet the needs of the body for oxygen. The ventilator can be set to take a certain number of breaths for you per minute and for how much additional oxygen is added to breath. A ventilator doesn't cure COVID-19. It helps you survive until you get better and your lungs can work on their own.

The patient requiring mechanical ventilation is placed under general sedation while intubation, the placement of a ventilation tube into their trachea, takes place. Later, sedation will be reduced or eliminated, depending on the patient's ability to tolerate the tubing which is often uncomfortable. While it's hooked up, most people are not able to eat and drink normally. They receive nutrients through an IV inserted by needle into a vein.

When the physician thinks you are well enough, your breathing is tested. The ventilator stays connected but set so that you can try to breathe on your own. When you breathe normally, the tubes are removed and the ventilator will be turned off. For those who need to be on a ventilator for an extended period of time, a tracheostomy may be required. During this procedure, a surgeon makes a hole in the front of the neck and inserts a tube into the trachea.

If the body's immune system does not fight off the infection, it can lead to a potentially fatal condition called acute respiratory distress syndrome (ARDS). In ARDS, the alveoli (tiny air sacs that allow oxygen to reach the blood stream and remove carbon dioxide) are inflamed and essentially drown as fluids fill the alveoli, reducing the lungs' ability to provide enough oxygen for survival.

As you know, the numbers of Mainers hospitalized in ICU care and on ventilators have hit all time new highs in the last week, and show no sign of slowing. Nationally estimates show that about 6% of people who have COVID-19 get critically sick and about 1 in 4 of those need a ventilator to help them breathe. Unfortunately these figures are higher in Maine and are further concerning as the weather and holidays bring us closer together inside.

Fatality rates for those on ventilators have been widely reported in medical journals. One metastudy (a report of studies on one topic) of 69 medical journal studies of respirator fatalities concluded that 47% of patients under age 40 and 84% of those over 80 requiring mechanical ventilation died. Studies also pointed out that a long list of underlying disease conditions including diabetes, coronary artery disease, obesity, chronic lung, kidney, liver and heart disease, and immunocompromise figure substantially in these fatality rates. Vaccination and booster doses provide our best protection. Masks, handwashing and interpersonal care are still vital.
