

COVID-19 Updates / News

Update from COVID-19 Advisory Group

The plan for reopening UUCC for in-person, indoor gatherings approved by the Board on August 12, 2021 depends on the COVID-19 pandemic being under control in our state and county. The Board adopted a Maine CDC metric that measures "community (person to person) transmission" of the virus. <u>The necessary CDC metric for us to reopen is no</u> <u>more than 10 new cases per 10,000 people in Kennebec County or the State of Maine.</u>



The present CDC metric data indicates that it is still unsafe for us to safely reopen.

Dr. Don on COVID 19 The New Variant, Omicron

South African scientists identified a new version of the coronavirus last week that they say is behind a recent spike in COVID-19 infections. It's unclear where the new variant actually arose, but it was first detected by scientists in South Africa and as of this week has now been seen in several southern African countries, Belgium, Netherlands, Hong Kong, Israel, England, France, Australia, Japan and Canada. (I think we can assume it has travelled widely, and that current travel bans will only slow the spread.)

Scientists know that the new variant is genetically distinct from previous variants including the beta and delta variants, but do not know whether these genetic changes make it any more transmissible or dangerous. So far, there is no indication the variant causes more severe disease. Even though some of the genetic changes in the new variant appear worrying, it's still unclear whether they will pose a public health threat. Some previous variants, such as the beta variant, initially alarmed scientists but didn't end up spreading very far.

As for where it came from, the coronavirus mutates as it spreads. Many variants, including those with worrying

genetic changes, often just die out. Scientists monitor COVID-19 sequences for mutations that could make the disease more transmissible or deadly, but they cannot determine that simply by looking at the virus. Sharon Peacock, Professor of Public Health and Microbiology in the Department of Medicine of the University of Cambridge said the variant "may have evolved in someone who was infected but could then not clear the virus, giving the virus the chance to genetically evolve." This is a scenario similar to how experts think the alpha variant which was first identified in England, also emerged, by mutating in an immune-compromised person.

Dr. Angelique Coetzee, a private practitioner and chair of South African Medical Association, was one of the first doctors in South Africa to detect the new variant. She told Reuters that the symptoms of the omicron variant were "very mild" and could be treated at home. Initial reported infections were among university students, younger individuals who tend to have more mild disease, but understanding the level of severity of the omicron variant will take days to several weeks, according to the World Health Organization.

Lawrence Young, a virologist at the University of Warwick, described the variant as "the most heavily mutated version of the virus we have seen." He said it was concerning that although the variant was only being detected in low levels in parts of South Africa, "it looks like it's spreading rapidly." There are some thirty mutations in the new virus, many in the virus spike proteins changing the spike structure. (The virus spike is what enables infection and are the point at which current vaccine and antibody therapy are effective. Spike changes may alter these agents' efficiency and enhance virus transmission.)

"We don't know if this new variant could get a toehold in regions where delta is," said Sharon Peacock, of the University of Cambridge. "The jury is out on how well this variant will do where there are other variants circulating." To date, delta is by far the most predominant form of the coronavirus, accounting for more than 99% of infections submitted to the world's biggest public database. Peacock said the data so far suggest the new variant has mutations "consistent with enhanced transmissibility," but said that "the significance of many of the mutations is still not known."

Jeffrey Barrett, director of COVID-19 Genetics at the Wellcome Sanger Institute, thought that the early detection of the new variant could mean restrictions taken now would have a bigger impact than when the delta variant first emerged. "With delta, it took many, many weeks into India's terrible wave before it became clear what was going on and delta had already seeded itself in many places in the world and it was too late to do anything about it," he said. "We may be at an earlier point with this new variant so there may still be time to do something about it."

Francis Collins, director of the National Institute of Health, told Fox News Sunday that it will take two or three weeks to tell whether antibodies from vaccines or previous infections will be effective against omicron. "We expect that most likely the current vaccines will be sufficient to provide protection," Collins said. "And especially the boosters will give that additional layer of protection."

Collins and Fauci both said the troubling emergence of omicron is yet another reason for Americans to get vaccinated and obtain booster shots. "Whether or not we're headed into a bleak or bleaker winter is really going to depend upon what we do," Fauci said. "So this is a clarion call as far as I'm concerned of saying let's put aside all of these differences that we have and say, 'if you're not vaccinated, get vaccinated. If you're fully vaccinated, get boosted, and get the children vaccinated also.' We now have time."
