She serves on the Board of Trustees for the Unitarian Universalist for Social Justice, works with the Multiple Sclerosis Foundation supporting caregivers and individuals newly diagnosed with MS since she is utilizing her experience as a person living with Multiple Sclerosis to support others in their healing journey.

Currently she is completing her Buddhist Ecclesiastical Endorsement studying under Roshi Joan Halifax. Beyssa is a lifelong fighter of systems of oppression since she believes in the words of Alice Walker, "Activism is my rent for living on the planet."



COVID-19 Updates / News

Update from COVID-19 Advisory Group

The plan for reopening UUCC for in-person, indoor gatherings approved by the Board on August 12, 2021 depends on the COVID-19 pandemic being under control in our state and county. The Board adopted a Maine CDC metric that measures "community (person to person) transmission" of the virus.

The necessary CDC metric for us to reopen is no more than 10 new cases per 10,000 people in Kennebec County or the State of Maine.



The present CDC metric data indicates that it is still unsafe for us to safely reopen.

Please note that discussions are taking place around reassessing the re-opening plan approved by the Board in August. The discussions may lead to a changing of the metrics OR to reopening the church. Discussions are continuing at the COVID-19 Advisory group meeting this evening and the Board meeting next Thursday. . More information will come. Stay tuned...

Dr. Don on Covid-19

Dr. Don on COVID-19 Will Omicron bring the pandemic to an end?

There is a growing sense of hope that if enough people build natural immunity to COVID-19 by catching the highly contagious Omicron variant, maybe we will reach "herd immunity" and soon can turn the corner on this disease. Maybe. But also maybe not, warned Dr. Anthony Fauci. On Monday, Dr. Fauci, President Biden's top medical adviser for Covid, was asked at the online World Economic Forum if this may be the year that the virus becomes endemic.

While Omicron seems to cause less severe disease than other variants, Dr. Fauci said "it is an open question as to whether or not Omicron is going to be the live virus vaccination that everyone is hoping for." He put air quotes around the phrase "live virus vaccination," meaning people becoming immune by having the COVID infection. To extend his thoughts on Omicron providing protection he added "the evolution of the pandemic is still an open question so as to the future – "the answer is we do not know."

There are two ways for a pandemic to end: the infectious disease is eradicated, or it becomes endemic, which means it still exists without being disruptive to society — like colds or chickenpox, for example. "If you look at the history of infectious diseases, we've only eradicated one infectious disease in man and that's smallpox." And Fauci said "That's not going to happen with this virus."

To become endemic COVID must evolve into a less dangerous disease for the pandemic to officially end. And although the highly contagious omicron variant is spreading like wildfire, some point to its low mortality rate as a sign that the virus may be becoming less severe. It's possible that Omicron could signal that the pandemic is ending, "but that would only be the case if we don't get another variant that eludes the immune response," Fauci said. "It's very disturbing, I believe to all of us as public health officials and scientists, [that there is] such a degree of pushback against regular, normal, easy-to-understand public health measures, reluctance to wear masks, reluctance to promote vaccination, reluctance to do kinds of public health measures." He continued: "You make the virus have an advantage when you don't implement, in a unified way, all the very well-recognized public health measures, particularly the vaccines."

Fauci, the Director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, added: "Even for a rich country like the United States, that supposedly was the best-prepared country for a pandemic, we are among a handful of the countries that have actually suffered the most. When you look now at the 65 million cases and the close to 900,000 deaths in our country, that is really, truly unfortunate, and something that we would have hoped would have been avoided."
