News from RE....

Building Bridges - Making Connections with our Congregation, our Faith, our Community, and our World

Happy New Year! RE lessons in December and January brought our children closer to their community and helped strengthen the connections to the world in which they live. In December, Chalice Children learned about similarities and differences of the cultural and religious holidays of Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, and Christmas through books, songs, games, and art. Our combined Navigators and Seekers groups spent several sessions exploring a photoessay that depicts everything that an average family consumes in a given week (and what it costs), laid out in thought-provoking detail, from families all around the world. It was an eye-opening experience for all of us to see the discrepancy of food distribution around the world and it sparked excellent conversations within our group. After we *thought globally, we acted locally* and ended our unit by spending a morning volunteering our services at the Augusta Food Bank. We left feeling grateful for what we are all blessed with, appreciative of what we all had just learned, and empowered that we can help make change in our community.

In January, children from all the groups had the chance to participate in an activity to help them gain a sense of appreciation of the challenges some people face with physical impairments (such as hearing, mobility, or visual). Children were randomly given a physical challenge (1 arm missing, no hands, blind, etc.) and we then simulated that challenge to the best we could with bandanas, medical tape, etc. Next, the children were asked to make themselves a snack, eat, and clean up their own mess with that physical challenge. It was quite a different experience for the kids and during reflection many of them remarked how it made them appreciate in a clearer and more meaningful way the physical challenges that some people face on a daily basis. It is through these meaningful experiences like the Food Bank and the Physical Challenge Exercise that our young UU's truly learn and strengthen their understanding of the principles of our faith; and when it is their turn to lead our world as adults, they will lead with a stronger sense of conviction, appreciation, respect for others, and love in their hearts.

Peaceful Heart Sangha

In 1967 Dr. King nominated him for a Nobel Peace Prize. In nominating him, Dr. King said: “Thich Nhat Hanh’s ideas for peace, if applied, would build a monument to ecumenism, to world brotherhood, to humanity.” As Joanne Friday has said “The practice of Engaged Buddhism is very similar to Dr. King’s practice of non-violence. Thich Nhat Hanh teaches us that compassion is a verb. Compassion without action is not very meaningful. We practice love in action. What Dr. King was practicing was also love in action, as a spiritual path to liberation. “

The Unitarian Universalist Community Church of Augusta, Maine also practices Compassion as a verb. I remember my husband’s mother, Eleanor Grimmnitz, who joined our church with me around 1993, saying “I’ve been in lots of churches before. This is the first church that doesn’t just talk about doing good. They do good.”

As I write this newsletter article on MLK Day, I feel grateful for Dr. King, Thich Nhat Hanh, UUCC, and so many others. I find it is so easy to get so caught up in all the terrible things that are happening in our world that I can forget to pause and feel gratitude for all that is going well, all the good works that are being done, all the positive transformations that are happening in this moment. That is one of the reasons that I was so happy to spend a morning with Lynn Deeves offering Mindfulness Meditation practices to the Coming of Age youth in our church on January 18. What a great group! What fun! I feel more hope for our world after spending time with such positive young energy.

Our Peaceful Heart Sangha meets weekly to reinforce this positive energy and to help us constantly readjust our focus. We learn to do our best to calm and center, and then show up for a difficult situation and respond as skillfully as we can. Many of you probably know that 86 year old Thich Nhat Hanh had a brain hemorrhage this fall and has not been able to speak, though he is getting physical therapy and is now awake, moving around more, and still occasionally offers his beautiful smile. He is recuperating in a hospital and will be in a stroke rehab center soon. Augusta's Warming Center Meets the Needs!

Our church is well represented on the Advisory Committee of Augusta's Warming Center, and we have been generous in supporting this seasonal community service. I'm constantly amazed by how important the Warming Center is, and am impressed that the staff and trained volunteers have cared for an average of 40 adults and children each day they have been open. On especially cold days, more than 60 people show up for the safe shelter they offer. In January the Warming Center was the recipient of our Share the Plate collection, and we donated **\$209.96** to their operating expenses. Our church has already provided some clothing of all sizes, but they are still in particular need of adult winter clothes, boots, jackets, etc. The staff reports that they are seeing an increased number of people who are homeless using their services this year, and that the Augusta police have been very cooperative in helping the Center find safe shelter in many unusual cases.

They also need the sort of contributions that this church was so generous with last year: **Coffee, creamer, sugar, hot chocolate, tea, healthy snacks**. There are children at the Warming Center every day, so think of the kind of snacks kids would like (peanut butter crackers, fruit wraps, etc). The staff could also use donations of **cleaning supplies** because a great effort is being made to keep the space clean and tidy by the volunteers who visit daily.

There is a container in the coat room marked "Warming Center" where donations can be deposited. They are also in need of a portable clothing rack where they can hang their donations, as well as hangers. If you have any extras, those can be bundled and put in the container.



Prepare to Be Inspired

How This Church Works and the Sabbatical Handbook...

Having grown up in a tradition where church was never called off, there was always a little guilt (alright, a lot of guilt) associated with missing the Sunday morning service when, of course, everyone was there but my family! Well, we've come to realize here at UUCG that there is more to getting to church in this century than in the past where everyone lived close by in the town where they attended church, cities had connected public transportation and weather was even more predictable.

At UUCG, many of our members live outside the limits of Augusta, several driving 15 to 45 minutes to get to services. The roads are icy, the visibility poor and not everyone has studded snow tires to keep them safe. When a storm is brewing, there is a set procedure on how we determine if services and activities will be cancelled on a Sunday. Whether it's a 4" or 12" storm, our procedure goes into effect.

The Sabbatical Handbook was prepared by Rev. Carie and members of the Sabbatical Committee, and its full content is on the church website. It outlines what procedures we agreed upon due to inclement weather, ministry in Carie's absence, Share The Plate Collections and even who writes the Soul Matters Packet.

In case of inclement weather, here's what happens: Kathy Shaw, Chair of the Worship Committee, consults with Gary Chapin, President, or in his absence, Martha Naber, Vice President. The President or Vice President may call the State Police (sometime between 5:00 and 6:00 a.m.) for direction on their view of driving conditions beyond the borders of Augusta and take their advice on whether or not it is a prudent decision to cancel Sunday activities and keep people safely off the roads. Notification of service changes, postponements or cancellations will be posted on the church website at www.augustauu.org.

If Sunday activities are cancelled, Kathy Shaw will notify all worship participants: including worship leader, worship associate, pianist and website manager. Gary or Martha will notify all church staff (Monique McAuliffe, Nicole Danielson, Bridget Convey, Lynn Smith) and the local television stations, WCHS, Channel 6; WGME, Channel 13; and WMTW, Channel 8 will be notified. Lynn Smith will then send out an All Church Email and change the church voicemail to reflect the extent of the cancellations for that day. This decision will hopefully be made by 7:00 a.m.

It's not easy to make changes to Sunday activities. However, we took the safety of our members and guests seriously as we determined the procedures listed in the Sabbatical Handbook. So, if one of those Sundays should again occur this winter.....be safe, be warm and enjoy the beauty of Maine.....without guilt....and come back safely next week.

Reports:

Clerk's report reviewed. Martha moved acceptance, Doug 2nd, accepted with one revision.

Treasurer's report: Church is financially stable with people paying their pledges. Mary put the \$3,000 natural gas rebate and the \$5,000 from the trust fund into the savings account. We will use it to pay down the energy loan at the end of the fiscal year. The annual appeal has brought in about \$2,000 so far. We have a full staff now so there are greater expense. Doug moved acceptance of report. Anna 2nd. Voted and approved.

Website update: Helen will present at the Feb. meeting as she was unable to attend due to the weather.

Finance Comm. Suggested a change of dates for the Finance 101: rescheduled for Feb. 15. Pizza will be served to those attending.

Ask The Board rescheduled due to service cancellation on Jan. 4 for Feb. 8 between services. Gary will notify Lynn and Nancee.

Leadership Council: Martha reported that the session will be Jan. 25 from 12:30-2:30. The agenda is updates on committee work, distribution of Who's IN Charge, and pledge packets for church leaders, and making connections with other committee's work.

Sabbatical Committee: Things are going smoothly. Noah Gottlieb has agreed to contact the visiting morning service leader clergy the week of the upcoming service. We now have the correct code for announcing snow cancellations on TV and radio. The service that was to be held Jan. 4 will be rescheduled later in the spring.

Acceptance of the clergy housing expense was moved by Liza, 2nd by Martha, voted acceptance.

As there was no more business the meeting was adjourned at 7:00 PM.

Seasoned Souls to Meet...


